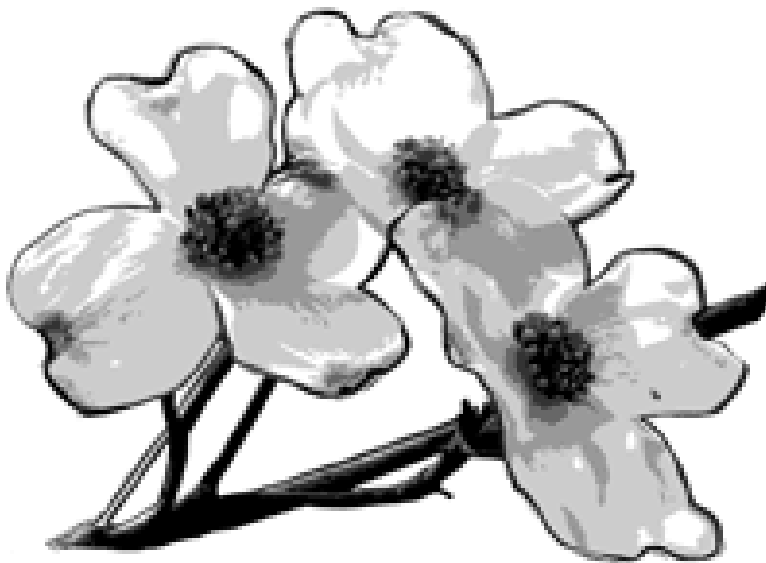

The Reverend's Ramblings or Why I Fear the Words, "But the Pastor Said...."

Part of our Lenten focus this year will be a study on the Apostles' Creed. Now, before you say, "How dull," allow me to tell you a true story.

In the second article of the Apostles' Creed we find the phrase, "He descended into hell." Ok, no big deal, not a problem, just one of those phrases we recite on a regular basis without much thought. Right? Sure, no problem, not a major issue, and nothing to get all up tight about. Well, that's true unless you're teaching Confirmation Class, and this exactly where I got into trouble a few years ago.

Confirmation students are often thought of as pre and junior teens who don't really pay attention to much beyond what interests them. Don't kid yourself! They have minds that are constantly working overtime (whether they admit it or not), and devour everything around them from words, to gestures, to food, to all sorts of other things. So, once, as I'm gleefully talking about the creed's second article, I get stopped and asked "the question" (actually two questions): "What is hell?" and "Why did Jesus go to hell?" Now I understand why I've kept all these theology books in my library for the past 34 plus years.

Being the consummate theologian my mind (but no one else) tells me I am, I proceeded to wax eloquently on the Hebraic, Greek, and modern understanding of hell. I diligently taught my young scholars about the mistranslation of the word "Hades" as well as the fact that the Hebrew word (Gehenah) simply means "the place of the dead." We could just as easily, or even more correctly say, "He descended to the dead." In fact, I tried to stop the inquisition at this point. It didn't work! Let's face it, you wear a clerical collar, you'd better have the answers. Isn't that what those four years of seminary were all about? Not to mention this is a great way to get the pastor off track for the next hour till class is over. (Hey, I was once in confirmation class, you know, back when Pterodactyls still ruled the skies)

Thus we proceeded to discuss the fact that Jesus, being just like us during his earthly life ("and became man"), when he died was laid in a tomb and therefore resided, as all humans eventually do, amongst the dead. We believe that our Lord suffered death as we all do. We believe that by experiencing the ultimate state of earthly death, Jesus is fully aware of our state. However, the resurrection is the "newness" of the good news: Jesus is raised from the dead and thereby conquers that last enemy of humanity. By descending to the place of the dead (hell, if you wish), Jesus breaks the bonds of death and shows us that he is truly the way to both new life here and now as well as the fullness of life with God in our own

resurrection after death. As followers of the Risen Christ, we have no need to fear, much less explain, hell. We are resurrection people who know what it means to follow the risen and living Lord in all we do now, and look forward, in time, to the great feast promised us in the presence of Jesus himself. My reward for this great theological dissertation was a phone call later that afternoon from a parent who wanted to know (after their dear one said while relating his confirmation class experience that day, "But the pastor said....") why I had told the class that they had to go to hell before they could go to heaven?

May this Lenten and Easter season bring you new joy and excitement in examining the greatest story of our faith. May our ministries, both personal and corporate, be renewed with enthusiasm as the disciples of the Risen Christ! May we experience the joy of a resurrected spirituality within ourselves and within our congregation, that the joy of the good news may become alive in and through us all. (No matter what you think you hear the pastor say....)

Core Planning Team Update

On Sunday, Feb. 13, the Core Planning Team held an open session for congregational participation in our efforts to determine *God's Will* for Saint Nicholas. This was the first of many opportunities that will be offered for congregational participation in our Core Planning process.

We were delighted to have representation from our education team, the church council, the choir, and folks from all services, who, together, make up the congregation called Saint Nicholas. In all, there were about fifteen adults who were part of the process, but you might be surprised to hear that many ideas were generated. Perhaps even more surprising, our session was not devoted solely to worship, as the planning team had intended. Almost spontaneously, ideas streamed forth freely, suggesting many new avenues for serving our Lord. I suspect that ideas will continue to surface from our afternoon together as we ruminate on our conversation.

The following passage is from the book we are using as our reference point, Luther Snow's "Power of Asset Mapping." It describes one church's experience as they sought ways to share the *Good News* in their community.

WE ARE WEDNESDAY PEOPLE. WE ARE SUNDAY PEOPLE

The Prince of Peace congregation in a suburban Northwest community started a Wednesday after-noon after-school program by thinking about and building on their assets. They had adults who had an interest in children; neighborhood kids who had skills, interests, and time after school; and good space for both learning and recreation.

Connecting the dots, they recognized that Wednesday nights would be a good time to coordinate the regular gatherings of several church teams, peer support groups, and the youth group. Having these gatherings on one night made scheduling much easier.

There was time available between the afternoon and evening agendas, so why not serve food? People coming for the after-school program stayed a little later to eat, while people coming for the evening activities came a little earlier.

With everyone gathered for a meal, there was naturally an opportunity to ask a blessing. Then they added a song. Soon, they were having a brief worship service. The pastor led a Bible study after dinner. The participants, who now numbered over 100, were mostly from the community but not from the congregation, so they were getting to know the liturgy. This did not increase participation in the Sunday worship service. People who came on Wednesday did not come on Sunday.

One day an especially large number of people showed up for dinner, and there was not room for everyone to worship in the usual space. So the pastor suggested that the people move to the sanctuary. That was the turning point. Once the Wednesday participants were invited into the sanctuary, they began to see themselves as members of church. Baptisms, confirmations, and membership rose as the Wednesday people and the Sunday people became one people.

As a church in transition, we have a wonderful opportunity to invite God to lead us on new paths. We have outstanding assets that include a great location, excellent facilities we can share, a capable, well-loved interim pastor to guide us, and, yes, we have people waiting to be challenged, taught, and led to reach out to others. It was just one decade ago that Saint Nicholas was the pride of our synod as its fastest growing congregation. The past few years have been, by necessity, a period of building our needed space for education and youth activities, as well as transition in pastoral leadership. We must make this interim period a time for planning, preparation, and action, so that when we welcome the pastor whom God has chosen for us, he or she will be truly excited to be coming to an active, motivated, Spirit-filled congregation. Our members, our new pastor, and most important, our Lord, deserve nothing less.

Prayer for the Day: Lord God, we are so grateful for your presence in our worship, in our ministries, and in our every effort to discern your will for this congregation. We pray for the person whom you have chosen to be our next pastor, and ask for your guidance in this process. We are your people. We pray and humbly ask for your direction so that all that we do is to your glory. In Christ's name we pray, Amen.

WORSHIP SERVICES VOLUNTEER CALENDAR

How do I volunteer for worship services? You can contact Barbara Harris, either by phone at 410-286-3257, or by email at bramharris@chesapeake.net.

You can also go on line at www.saintnicholaslutheran.org. Look at the section labeled "Volunteer Opportunities" and click on "Worship Services Volunteer Calendar." Click on the date, and which of the three worship services for which you want information. The screen that comes up will give you the entire list of those who are serving on that date. If there are openings where volunteers are still needed, you can follow the instructions on that page, which sends an email to Barbara Harris. You can also sign up for a reminder notice.

How do I know what I volunteered for? You can also use the same website and locations to see what you volunteered for by clicking on the date and service, and seeing if you are listed. In addition, the newsletter has the calendar for the entire month – you can pull it out, highlight your assignment, and put it on your fridge or bulletin board. The *Weekly* insert in the church bulletin has a listing of who is helping at worship the following week. And finally, check the church bulletin when you get to church to see if your name is listed for that day's service!

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Sunday Morning Hospitality Team Coordinator: Around 100 congregation members are on the Sunday Morning Hospitality team. We are in need of a coordinator who will contact team members to schedule them for a specific Sunday in the upcoming month. This simple ministry can be done face-to-face at church or from home and involves making quite a few phone calls and emails every month until the 4-5 slots for the month are filled. If you are interested in this ministry, please contact Barbara Harris.

Lawn Mowing Teams: Do you love hands-on work in the great outdoors! Join one of the lawn-mowing teams. Each team takes a turn, in rotation, to mow the lawn and trim during the growing season. Saint Nicholas has 2 lawn tractors that make fast work of the large grass area. Want to learn more? Contact Bruce Schmale or Barbara Harris.

Altar Care Team Member: A new team member is needed to assist with altar care at the 9am service when there is a 5th Sunday in a month. Altar care involves working with another team member to set up the altar before the 9am service, clean up after the service, and set up the altar for the 11:15am service. If you like hands-on, behind the scenes work that helps our worship service run smoothly, this is the job for you!

Lenten Pita Bread Provider: During Lent, we change from using loaves of home-baked bread to using pita bread for communion. Providers don't have to bake this, just buy a package big enough for use at both the second and third services. Bring it to the sacristy (the room behind the altar) by 8:40 am on Sunday morning. Sign up for a Sunday in Lent using the sign-up sheet posted on the bulletin board in the narthex. We start using pita bread on Ash Wednesday, March 9, and use it through Maundy Thursday on April 21.
